**FROM OUR RECTOR**

Dear Parishioners,

This week we celebrate Thanksgiving. Some of us are able to gather with our families, many of us are not. But in either case, the holiday still gives us pause to recall the many blessings that God bestowed on us. While this celebration is a secular feast, it reminds us all of the importance of giving thanks to Our Heavenly Father for all He does for us and to thank all those in our lives that we take for granted. Saying our thanks indicates how important they are to us and confirms our love for them.

This week's Gospel is a continuation from last week. Last Sunday we read that Jesus told his disciples that there is no way to know the day nor the hour when the Son of Man will return. Therefore, we are to remain vigilant and ready to receive Jesus in the Kingdom of Heaven at all times. In today's Gospel, Jesus instructs his disciples on how they are to conduct themselves while they wait in hopeful anticipation of the Kingdom of Heaven. Jesus tells the parable of the talents, in which he teaches about the importance of using our gifts and talents that God has given us in service to the Kingdom of Heaven.

Jesus' parable this week talks about Christian discipleship using a financial metaphor. Before embarking on a journey, the master entrusts his talents to his servants. Each servant is entrusted with a different number of talents according to their abilities. A talent was a coin of great value for the time. When the master returns, he discovers that the first and second servant invested their talents wisely and have doubled the money given to them. Because of this, the master rewards these servants and they enter into the joy of the master. However, the third servant has the exact same amount that was given to him because he was afraid of losing the money so rather than investing the talent he buries it in the ground. He risked absolutely nothing; he did not even deposit the money into the bank where it could earn interest. Because of his inactions, the master punishes this servant and his talent is given to the servant who brought in the greatest return. Needless to say, this servant does not enter into the joy of the master.

In my experience, whenever I encounter someone who is using their gifts and abilities that God has given them for His service, they seem to radiate a sustainable joy. I am often reminded of a quote from the Old Testament prophets when they said, "The joy of the Lord is my strength." If you use what God has given you for His glory, you will enter into the joy of Jesus. However, if like the servant that buried the talent, and you are fearful to use your gifts for His Kingdom, then you will not open yourself up to experience His joy.

The key to fully understanding the parable of the talents is to remember that the talents did not belong to the servants. They belong to the master who gave them to the servants to use on his behalf. They were entrusted with taking care of what was given to them; to look after them while the master is away. In a similar way, we are not the owner of the gifts that God has given us. We are entrusted to use them on behalf of God and to watch over them. Using this mindset, we are readily able to make decisions that will honor Him instead of putting ourselves and our needs first. This week we are called to reflect on our own gifts and ask ourselves if we have buried them, or are we using them in service to God and to others.

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

Thankful for the ways God is at work with in the archdiocese

Even though times may be challenging, our hearts are being forged together as we walk through changes

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Happy Thanksgiving!

Of the many things I'm grateful for this year, I want to name the following three in a special way.

First, the priests of the Archdiocese of St. Louis. We've been engaged together these past several years in the major task of reshaping the footprint of the archdiocese. Their fidelity, willingness and creativity—and honestly, just their brotherhood—have been sources of strength for me. I hope you'll join me in being thankful for their priesthood and for them as individuals.

Second, the people of the archdiocese. The generosity of the people here never ceases to amaze me—and I don't mean principally financial generosity. Yes, the financial generosity of the people of the archdiocese is amazing. But, truly, that's only the tip of the iceberg. The rest of the iceberg is a deep well of personal warmth and generosity. Maybe only someone who comes from outside the area—like me—can truly appreciate it. But I have seen it and been welcomed by it. I'm thankful for all of you!

Third, the task we've been given in this time and place. It's not an easy task, to be sure! But God has given it to us, and I'm grateful we're in it together. It makes me think of times in the Bible when God was trying to teach His people something new. Those times were never easy. But later generations looked back on the time of growth with a touch of envy: "Would that we had lived in such momentous times!" Well, we're living in such a time!

I think, too, of soldiers, spouses, teams and friends who have gone through something hard. Afterward, it wasn't the difficulty of the experience as much as the "being in it together" that they remembered, which continued to warm their hearts. I think our hearts are

Think back to some technological changes when things were still getting sorted out. The choice between 8-track and cassette tapes for audio recording. The choice between VHS and Beta for video recording. The choice between 5¼- and 3½-inch floppy disks for data storage. We're going through something like that when it comes to parishes and evangelization these days. It's a time of experimentation; it's not entirely clear what the best methods will turn out to be. In fact—as with the examples I just gave—what ends up working best may not be on our radar yet! But we're trying new things out. Unlike with technology, the answer isn't going to be the same in every case. But I believe that, between the priests and the people of the archdiocese, we'll figure it out.

There are many discouraging things in the world today. But, amid them all, I remain encouraged because I believe we're in God's hands and because I see God at work in the priests and the people of the Archdiocese of St. Louis. So, this week finds me hopeful and thankful. God bless you. Happy Thanksgiving!

The Gospel of the Lord

Jesus told his disciples this parable:

“A man going on a journey called in his servants and entrusted his possessions to them. To one he gave five talents; to another, two; to a third, one—to each according to his ability. Then he went away. Immediately the one who received five talents went and traded with them., and made another five. Likewise, the one who received two made another two. But the man who received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and buried his master’s money.

After a long time, the master of those servants came back and settled accounts with them. The one who received five talents came forward bringing the additional five. He said, ‘Master, you gave me five talent. See, I have five more.’ His master said to him, ‘Well done my good and faithful servant. Since you were faithful in small matters, I will give you great responsibilities. Come, share your master’s joy.’ Then the one who had received two talents also came forward and said, ‘Master, you gave me two talents. See, I have made two more.’ His master said to him, ‘Well done my good and faithful servant. Since you were faithful in small matters, I will give you great responsibilities. Come, share in your master’s joy.’ Then the one who had received the one talent came forward and said, “ Master, I knew you were a demanding person, harvesting where you did not plant and gathering where you did not scatter; so out of fear I went off and buried your talent in the ground. Here it is back.’ His master said to him in reply, ‘You wicked lazy servant! So you knew that I harvest where I do not plant and gather where I do not scatter? Should you not then have put my money in the bank so that I could have got it back with interest on my return? Now then! Take the talent from him and give it to the one with ten.’

For everyone who has, more will be given and he will grow rich; but from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away. And throw this useless servant into the darkness outside, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth.”

Matthew 25:14-30

A Call to do the Work of the Kingdom of God with the Gifts we have been Given

A man embarking on a long journey entrusts his servants with different amounts of his money based on the abilities. Two servants invest the money given to them and end up doubling the return. When the master returns and learns how they used their talents wisely, the servants receive praise and are honored with more responsibility. The third servant, out of fear, hides the money by digging a hole and burying it in the ground. When the master learns of this, the servant is chastised for his unwise use of his talents, and he loses the only talent that he had.

When read together as a sequence, the readings for today are a call for all the faithful to do the work of the Kingdom of God with the gifts that we have been given by God. The first reading sings the praises of the worthy wife who uses her talents to labor for good. The Psalm tells us that those who follow the Lord are blessed. The second reading reminds us that we are all children of light and goodness. And in the Gospel reading Jesus tells the parable of the talents in which the servants who used their resources wisely are praised.

Several themes emerge from the Gospel for today such as stewardship, accountability, risk and growth, work ethic, and divine judgement. The Gospel emphasizes the importance of wisely managing resources or gifts given by God. Each servant in the parable of the talents is held accountable for how they use their talents, which highlights the theme of personal responsibility. The servants who double their talents work hard which suggests the value of effort and diligence throughout our spiritual life. Likewise, the servants who invest their talents are taking a great risk, suggesting that spiritual growth involves stepping out of our own comfort zone.

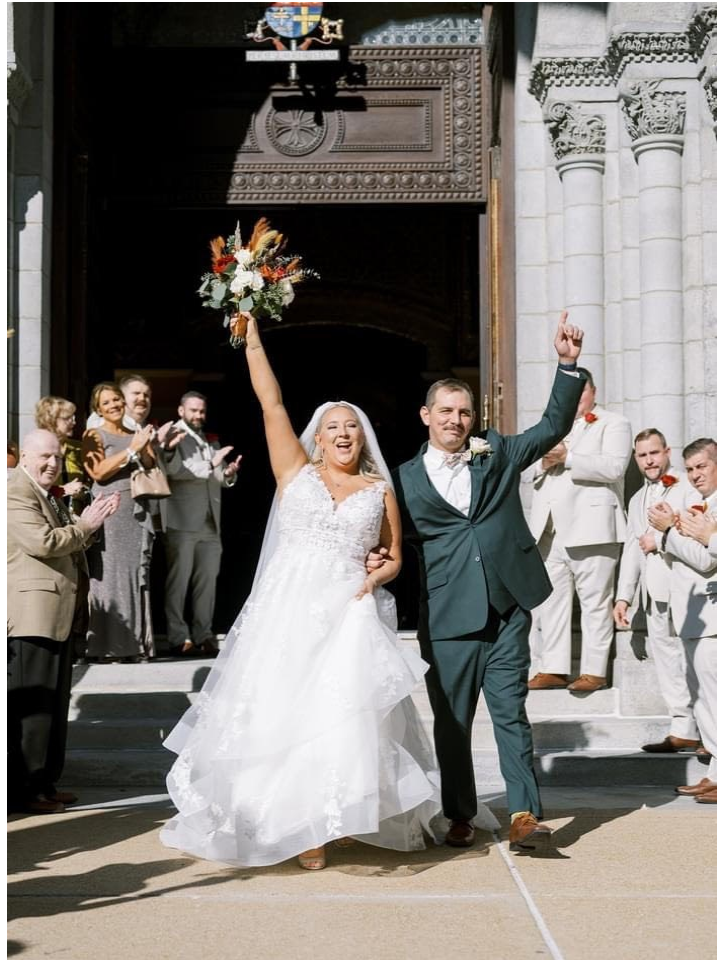


Celebrating Thankfulness at the Cathedral Basilica
