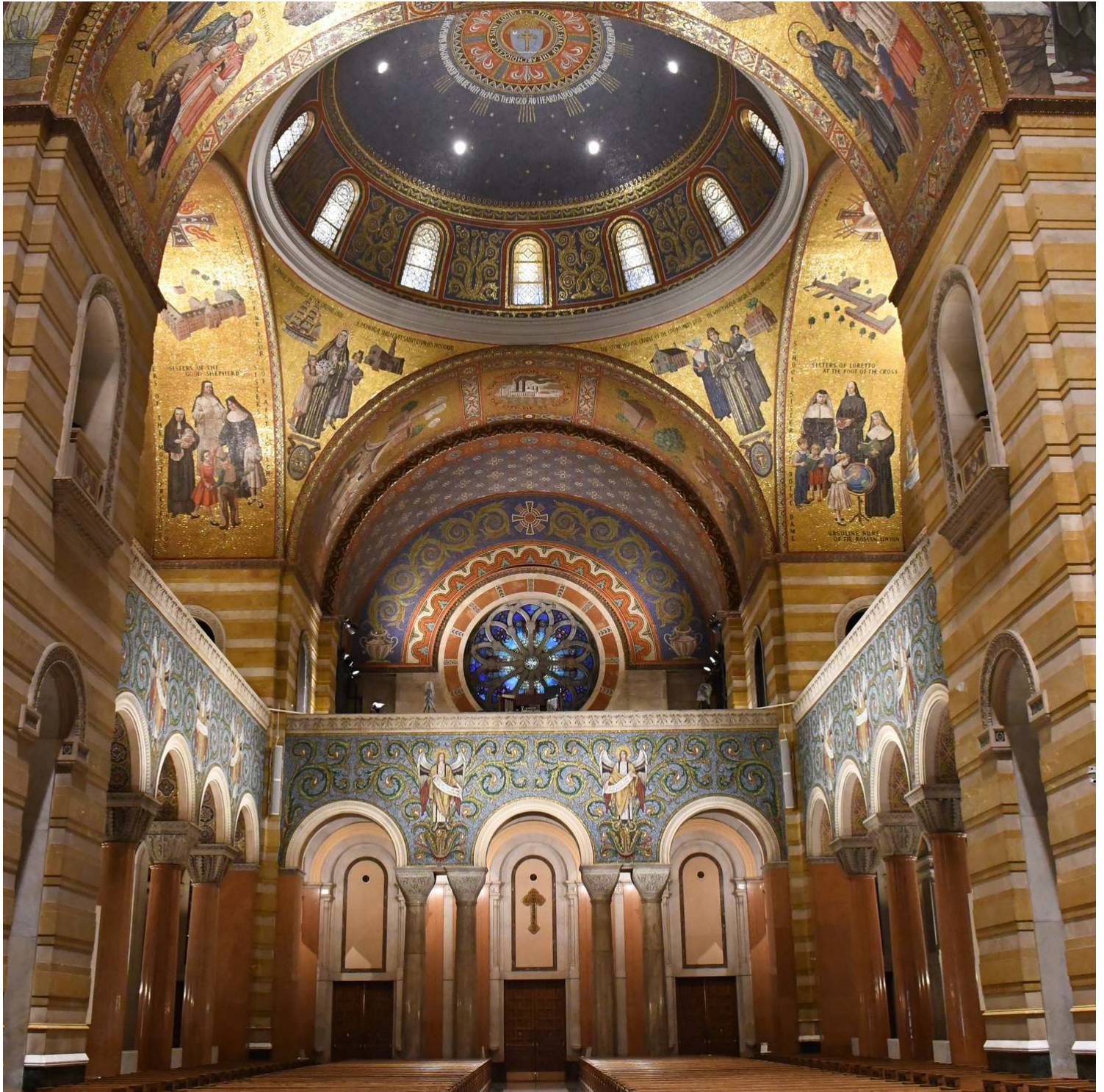

Dear Parishioners,

A week after the Solemnity of her Assumption into Heaven, the liturgy invites us to venerate the Blessed Virgin Mary with the title of "Queen". We contemplate the Mother of Christ crowned by her Son, in other words associated with his universal kingship, as she is portrayed in numerous mosaics and paintings.



The small and simple young girl of Nazareth became Queen of the world!

This is one of the marvels that reveal God's Heart. Of course, Mary's queenship is totally relative to Christ's kingship. He is the Lord whom, after the humiliation of death on the Cross, the Father exalted above any other creature in Heaven and on earth and under the earth.

Today, however, let us as God's children renew our devotion to the One whom Jesus bequeathed to us as Mother and Queen. Let us entrust to her intercession the daily prayer for peace, especially in places where the senseless logic of violence is most ferocious, to build the civilization of love. Maria, Regina pacis, ora pro nobis! Mary Queen of Peace, pray for us.

After preaching in Galilee, Jesus finds himself almost alone. He had tried to make the crowds who were following him the "new people" of God, but he had to face his first defeat: everyone had abandoned him. He finds himself alone, with that small group of disciples. He brings them to a deserted place, in the region of Caesarea Philippi, and asks them what the people think of him.

The disciples' answers to Jesus' question reflect the widespread uncertainty: some see in him the Baptist brought back to life, others Elijah, while others compare him to Jeremiah or other prophets. However, they all saw him as a great prophet. But certainly not as the one in whom God himself is speaking and acting. In reality Jesus wanted to know what they thought of him. He asks, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter speaks on behalf of them all. He answers with a profession of faith: "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." Every believer participates in the name, story, and vocation of Peter in order to build the spiritual house, the community of believers. First, we have to answer the question: Who do you say that I am?

Returning to the Promised Land of Joy Involves Undoing the Habits of Sin

Rather than complaining, we should pivot into making an offering of the unfairness and frustrations that we experience

Dear brothers & sisters in Christ,

Can we talk about sin? I know it's not comfortable; but it's necessary and helpful.

Rather than start with a definition, however, let's start with our experience. When something goes wrong — someone cuts you off in traffic, you get sick, your flight gets delayed and so on: What's your first reaction, what's your best reaction, and how long does it take you to get from the one to the other? (Or, how often is your first reaction your only reaction?)

Our first reaction is typically to rail against the other driver, to grumble about the sickness, to complain about airlines and so on. Sometimes we aren't even sure what a best reaction would look like! (Hint: It involves turning the hardship into an offering.)

This is where it's helpful to talk about sin. The distance between our first reaction and our best reaction is the distance between the spiritual state we're living in and the kingdom of heaven. It gives us a sort of spiritual map of where we are, and the route we need to take to grow in holiness.

We're offered a series of readings from the prophet Ezekiel these weeks. He made his life a prophetic image of the consequences of Israel's sin: the exile. Then, when the exile happened, he became the prophet of return. Remember the dry bones coming to life? Certainly, that looks forward to the future resurrection. But in its original context it was also a prophetic image of return from the lifelessness of exile.

As Ezekiel's life and career were a lesson for ancient Israel, so the history of ancient Israel is a lesson in the spiritual life for us. We also undergo a spiritual exile from the promised land of joy because of our sins — each of us knows that from experience. We also long for return.

Bringing our dry bones back to life involves undoing the habits of sin that have taken root in us.

We celebrate the feast day of St. John Eudes on Aug. 19, and he provides a beautiful meditation on what's needed. He says: "He [Jesus] desires that whatever is in Him may live and rule in you: His breath in your breath, His heart in your heart, all the faculties of His soul in the faculties of your soul." So, for example, all the sadness of Jesus (who wept over Jerusalem), and all His generosity (He gave His very life to us and for us) belong to us as members of His body. Do we use them?

The reactions of Jesus are like Christmas presents, already given, waiting to be unwrapped. Our progress in discipleship can be measured by our answer to three questions: Do you desire to unwrap those gifts? Are you working on using those gifts? How's it going in letting those gifts become habits? The answers to those questions give us a kind of roadmap: They tell us where we are, how far we have to go in the life of discipleship and what our next step is.

There are so many situations in life about which we can say: it's not fair! Even if that's 100 percent true, it still leaves us to ask a key question: Will we pivot on that unfairness into complaining, or will we pivot — as Jesus did — into making the unfairness an offering?

We celebrate the feast of the Queenship of Mary on Aug. 22 and the feast of St. Louis, King of France, on Aug. 25. Let's ask them to help us govern our lives more deeply, so we can move more quickly and easily from our first reactions to Jesus' own reactions to the frustrations of the world.

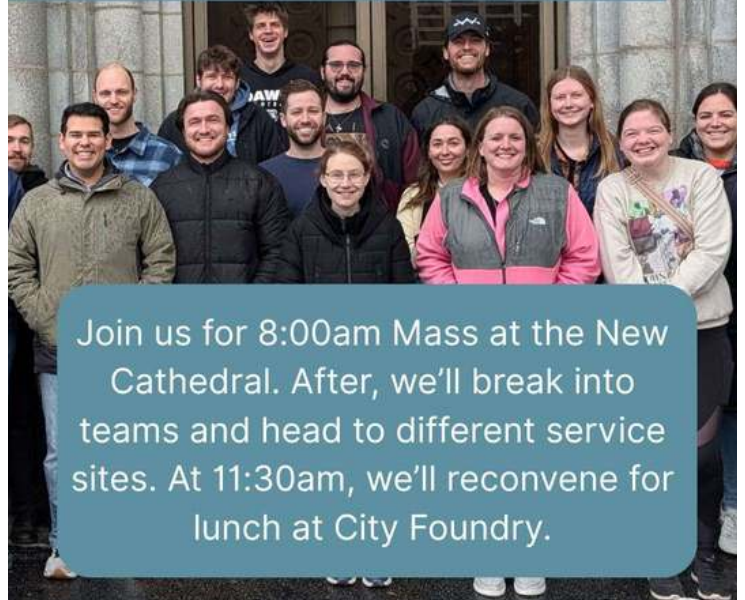
