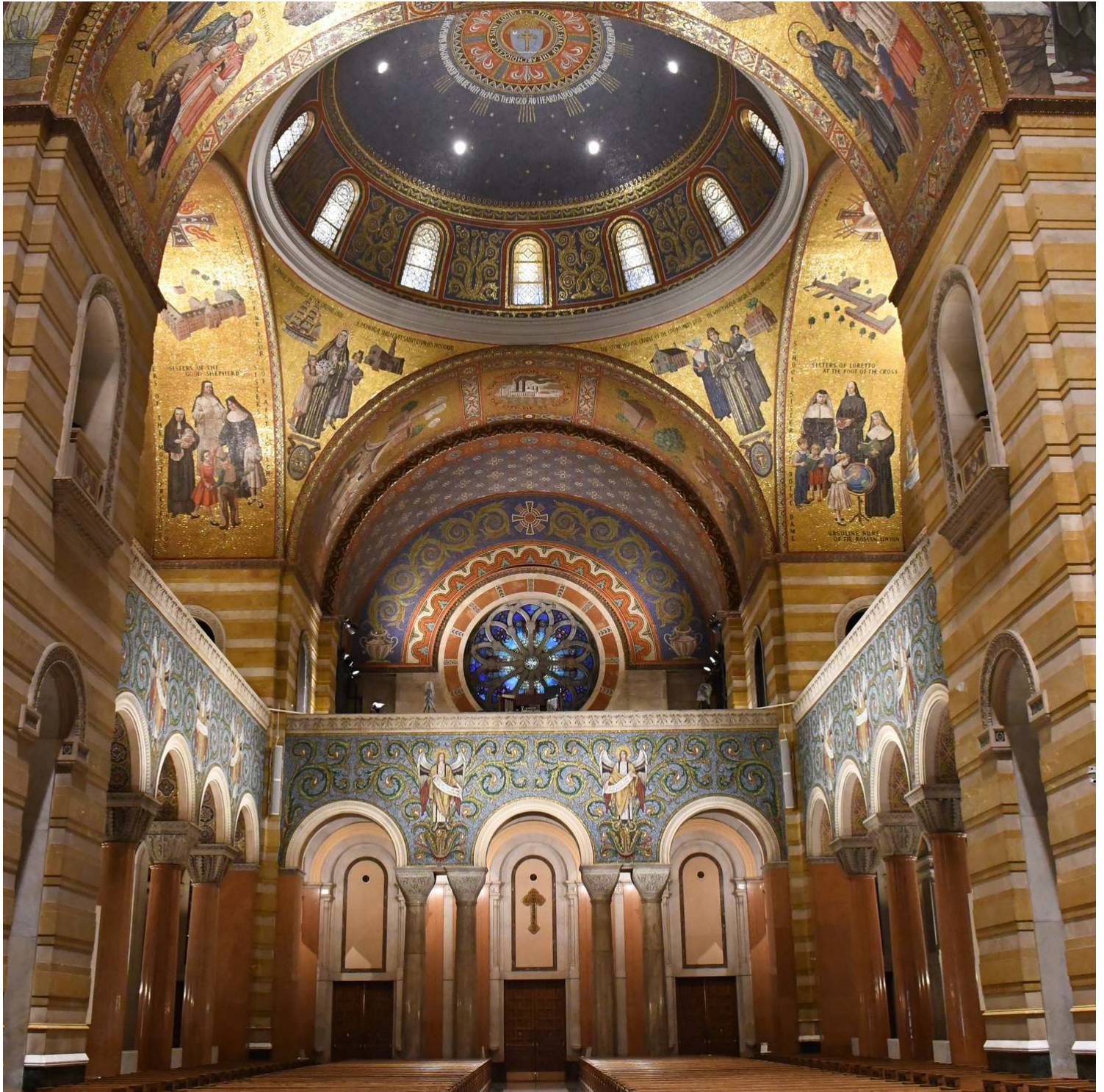

Dear Parishioners,

Jesus assures us of his presence among us. Despite our frailties and shortcomings, our gathering together becomes a sign of his friendship and love. Each time we come together for the celebration of the liturgy, we receive a gift from the Lord: the gift of one another.

This is something we should never take for granted. In a world where loneliness and isolation touch so many lives—and where even neighbors can find it difficult to live together—the Gospel continues to remind us that communion is possible. Christ calls us out of isolation and teaches us the art of living together as brothers and sisters. Our coming together for the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass strengthens that bond. It helps us keep alive the hope that our world can be different.

The prophet Ezekiel speaks of another important responsibility: “I have made you a watchman for the house of Israel.” A watchman sees, listens, and remains attentive. Our world needs such men and women who feel a responsibility not simply for themselves, but for others. The Christian watchman notices suffering and responds to it, but also recognizes signs of goodness, gives thanks for them, and sees within them the presence of God, who never abandons his people.

To be a watchman requires listening. Without listening, we can easily fall asleep spiritually, simply accepting the attitudes and divisions of the world around us. Listening keeps the heart awake. And Christian vigilance is always connected to others, because there is no true Christian life lived entirely in isolation.

Jesus makes this responsibility even more concrete in the Gospel: “If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault.” Our responsibility for one another comes from the fact that we are indebted to one another in love. We have been loved abundantly by God, often far beyond what we deserve, and therefore the Christian life can never simply mean avoiding evil. We are called to actively love.

Being conscious of this debt of love should make us more attentive, and more sensitive to what another person may be lacking. It should especially open our eyes to the poor, the lonely, and those who might otherwise be forgotten.

Saint Paul sums it up beautifully: “Owe nothing to anyone, except to love one another.” That is the debt we will never completely repay—and the one debt Christians should gladly spend their lives trying to fulfill. For, as Saint Paul reminds us, love is the fulfillment of the law.

Jesus Made His Life a Reparation and Calls Us to do the Same

While we may be tempted to respond to the disorders of the world with rage or resignation, reparation is more effective

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Have you ever hungered for something that wasn't food?

When you're trying to solve a crossword puzzle, you might be hungry for a word that fits the clue.

Broadcasters might announce that the Cardinals are "hungry for a victory." You might hunger for a family reconciliation. Some children are described as "starved" for attention or affection.

That helps us make sense of what Jesus means when He says: "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness." These are people who sharpen their sense of the disorders in the world and "hunger" to make things right.

There are different reactions to the things that are wrong in the world. One is resignation: People think that nothing will ever change, so there's no sense wasting energy trying to do something. That's tempting, because it's partially true. Through the long annals of history, human nature hasn't really changed. But it's only a partial truth because, in those same annals, while human nature doesn't change, individual humans do. Resignation isn't a good option.

Another reaction is rage: People are angry at the injustices of the world, and anger gives them energy to battle those injustices. Rage is also tempting, because it's rooted in a partial truth. Situations are wrong; anger does give energy. But you can see this, too, in the long sweep of history: Rage doesn't actually build a better world. Rage simply leaves a path of destruction. Then someone actually has to rebuild. Rage isn't a good option.

A third reaction — and one that's not much pursued, but one I would like to propose for our consideration — is reparation. The deepest, most effective response to the disorders of the world is exemplified by Jesus. He didn't resign Himself to the sinful state of the

world, nor did He come in a destructive rage.

He entered the situation. He prayed. He worked. He let the sins of the world crash upon Himself, bearing the weight in His own body. That's how He brought about our redemption. And He asked us to pick up our cross and follow Him.

That might seem small, almost too small: to see the injustices of the world and not respond with massive structural changes, but simply to enter into that problem through my own prayer and to make reparation for that problem in my own life. But here's the thing: God seems to prefer the small! "You, Bethlehem-Ephrathah, too small to be among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to be ruler in Israel."

Bethlehem was small. Nazareth was small. Israel was small. Salvation went forth into the world from those small places. Might it go forth from our small lives, too? I say all of this because this week we will observe the 25th anniversary of 9/11. Twenty-five years later, what do we hunger for? Jesus tells us that "the measure with which you measure will in return be measured out to you." We're tempted to measure out resignation — and not without reason. But do we really want God to measure out resignation to us? We're tempted to measure out rage — and not without reason! But do we really want God to measure out rage to us?

What if, instead, we hunger for Jesus to live in us and to come forth from us? Then, like Him, we might make our lives — our prayer and work — a reparation. That would be a deeper response — the most effective response — to the disorders in the world.
